

Davis said the fee for the land conservancy completing the report is \$10,000, but the borough should be able to obtain \$5,000 of that fee from ANJEC. Also, the borough will be able to use funding from its open space tax to pay the \$5,000 balance.

Councilman James Freda asked if a new ERI would add further impediments to developing recreation fields in the borough. State Highlands officials told municipal representatives that they would not likely support Highlands exemptions for the field adjacent to the municipal building because of its proximity to a trout production stream or at the Boonton Avenue Field because it sits next to the Taylortown Reservoir.

Freda said he envisioned a new ERI making it even harder for the borough to make municipal facility improvements.

"The Land Conservancy has been great. I'm just frustrated with all the DEP (state Department of Environmental Protection) and EPA (federal Environmental Protection Agency) hurdles that we have faced," said Freda.

Noting that the borough is in a Highlands Preservation Area and virtually no new buildings can go up within its borders, Councilman Daniel O'Dougherty questioned the need for a new ERI.

Councilman Gary Moleta said the ERI can be used by the borough as a tool whenever there is any land use application. It will help the municipality make responsible decisions. Citing examples, Moleta said the updated ERI could have been helpful when considering improvements to the Department of Public Works building and when Fayson Lakes Water Company was pondering a location for a water tower.

Mayor Robert Collins said he feels the updated ERI will be used as a tool to support where active recreation can be located in Kinnelon.

Currently the borough must update its Master Plan for land use and the revised ERI will be part and parcel to that, he said.

"I view it as a resource, not as a detriment," said Collins. "Otherwise we have to rely on the DEP to tell us with its maps where things can and cannot go. I think this could potentially support active and passive recreation."

Vreeland said the drafting of an ERI will gain the borough 20 points toward its Sustainable New Jersey certification. According to the Sustainable New Jersey website, Sustainable Jersey is a certification program for New Jersey's municipalities that are making the effort to "go green," save money, and take steps to sustain the quality of life over the long term. Kinnelon is in the process of becoming certified.

Sustainable Jersey identifies concrete actions that municipalities can implement to become "certified" and be considered leaders on the path to a sustainable community. Sustainable Jersey offers guidance and tools to enable communities to make progress on each action, provides access to grants, and identifies opportunities for municipalities to make progress toward the actions.

Davis said a new digitally produced ERI would be much more easily changed and updated than the 1973 NRI. The Geographic Information System data on a new ERI will include geography, geology, topography, vegetation, flood hazard areas, aquifers, potable water, ground water sources, wetlands wildlife, historic places, air quality, and climate.

Davis said some updating of the information contained in the 1973 NRI was done when the borough went through the Highlands Plan Conformance process. Under this process, the borough completed a Highlands Environmental Resources Inventory module. The information contained in this report is not as complete and detailed as the ERI, she indicated.

Though the council did not commit to supporting the new ERI, the governing body could vote on the matter at its March 15 meeting.
