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MATE CHALLENGE

The New Jersey Student Climate Challenge starts with a question-how can we meet the challenges posed by the climate crisis? To help answer it, middle and high school students are encouraged to identify and complete a school or community project to address a cause or impact of climate change. The students then create a short digital story video to highlight what they have accomplished. To support and inspire student action, educational sessions are offered. The sessions spotlight local impacts of climate change and strategies to address them, as well as success stories about what students are already accomplishing.

ENTRY HIGHLIGHTS

The Climate Challenge is free and open to New Jersey public schools; students in grades 6 to 12 and are eligible to participate.

Teachers register and integrate the Climate Challenge into their classroom or club activities.

Student teams complete a school or community-based climate action project and create a short digital story video.

TIMELINE

Registration Opens: October 25, 2021

Educational Sessions: **December 2021 - February 2022**

Student Team Entries Due: April 20, 2022

Winners Notified: May 15, 2022 Awards Ceremony: June 2022

AWARDS CEREMONY

First, second and third place winners in a middle school and a high school category are selected by a panel of judges that includes educators and representatives from local non-profits, state agencies and the partner organizations.

Schools with winning submissions receive a grant to support their climate education initiatives: first place \$2,500, second place \$1,000 and third place \$500.

Student team winners and their teachers are recognized at an awards ceremony hosted by the Drumthwacket Foundation with the New Jersey Governor and First Lady.

CLIMATE SESSIONS

Students and their teachers can participate in virtual sessions to learn about the New Jersey Student Climate Challenge and actionable ways to address the climate crisis. The sessions will energize and motivate participants as they prepare climate projects.

Topic Focused Student Sessions

Students are invited to participate in virtual sessions that focus on local actions they can take to address the climate crisis. Participants hear from New Jersey experts and student activists who discuss case studies of local climate action and share the resources available to support student action.

Teacher Professional Development Sessions

Expert teacher educators guide teachers from across content areas on ways to identify the big ideas of climate change and to integrate those climate concepts into the curriculum using high-quality (and free) educational resources. Strategies for scaffolding and supporting student-centered action projects are shared.
